



# Enhanced Services Contract Reporting Options

## Drug Misuse

In Scotland there were 455 drug-related deaths in 2007, 34 (8 per cent) more than in 2006 and 231 (103 per cent) more than in 1997. The number of drug-related deaths has risen in eight of the past ten years. The long-term trend appears to be steadily upwards. There has also been a marked increase in the numbers of deaths involving, heroin and/or morphine, cocaine and alcohol.

The EScro Drug Misuse module provides a full data collection and reporting suite of software to provide an integrated solution for both consultation and reporting on patients being treated under the enhanced service.

This specifically designed module has been tailored to allow the clinician a crystal clear view of regional requirements, offering the relevant patient drug related history and ensuring all data recording requirements and supporting documentation are within a few clicks of each other.
